Removed despite his brother's objections, the brain was placed in an oil-cloth bag and ferried across the Delaware River to the American Anthropometric Society

in Philadelphia. One doctor noted the "magnificent symmetry of the skull" and recorded a 45-ounce weight. The autopsy states it would join

a collection of "high-type brains" of scientists and eminent men. Injected with a special solution, the brain would be hardened and preserved,

the external surfaces photographed, and a plaster cast made. The brain could then be compared with lesser types: apes and criminals and women.

But none of this was done. When the brain was accidentally dropped, it broke up, it ran: each component part that Whitman believed corresponded to a personality trait

dispersed, Self-esteem dribbling down the examination table, Caution skidding behind the door, Adhesiveness splashed on the doctor's hands, Combativeness lurking

by the legs of a wooden stool, Philoprogenitiveness in lumps on the lab's white tile floor. The oily scum of the preserving alcohol, the stench, the dashed and sticky remnants.
